**PUBLIC SAFETY ALERT
CONVICTED SEX OFFENDER**

In the interest of community safety, Chief Daniel Parkinson of the Cornwall Community Police Service, under the authority of the Police Services Act of Ontario, discloses the following information regarding 54-year-old Michel Joseph MAYBURY.

Michel MAYBURY was released from custody after having served an eleven-month jail sentence for a sexual assault on a 5-year-old male that occurred in 2004. He has convictions dating back to 1974, including robbery, armed robbery, personating a peace officer, gross indecency, indecent assault on a male, indecent act, exposure to person under age of 14 and sexual assault.



He is described as a white male, 5'7", 169 lbs, with short brown hair and green eyes.

He is subject to numerous conditions as a result of a court ordered prohibition that includes:

- Not to attend a public park, public swimming area where persons under 14-years-old are present or expected to be present, or daycare centre, school ground, playground or community centre.
- Not to use a computer to communicate with person under 14-years-old.

Michel MAYBURY will be residing within the community and the Cornwall Community Police Service is advising the public to use caution at all times and to practice sound crime

The Cornwall Community Police Service will continue to closely monitor the conditions of this release in an ongoing effort to ensure public safety and security.

SAFETY ON THE STREET

There are ways in which you can reduce the risk of being a victim:

- Walk assertively and in well-lit areas.
- Avoid being alone if you can.
- Walk in the centre of the sidewalk, away from alleys and doorways.
- If you suspect you are being followed, cross the street, go to the nearest home, a service station or a business and call the police.
- Be aware of your surroundings and avoid areas that increase your chances of being a victim. (Unlit areas of parks, vacant land and parking lots)
- Report problems to the police, we welcome the information and can advise you on prevention methods.
